It is February 28, and it is overcast and beginning to rain. As I look out my office window there isn't much which I would describe as attractive, let alone beautiful. There are patches of snow on the dead leaves and not yet green grass. There are no spring flowers. No leaves on the trees.

At this point in the seasonal calendar, we all are looking for signs of the transformation from winter to spring. Right now we

don't have many. Except one. One which is so subtle, it is easily missed. The male American Goldfinches are beginning their annual transformation.

If you aren't a birder, casual or avid, you may think these beautiful little birds leave our area for the winter. They don't. There are four of them at my feeders as I write. They are, for the most part, still in their drab gray-green and black plumage. However, they have begun the transformation to their stunning summer yellow and black feathers. By April, they will essentially look the way we expect them to look.



As a person who enjoys watching birds and thinking about Christianity, I am thankful this process occurs most dramatically during Lent and is essentially completed around Easter. Like the male American Goldfinch, we also have the opportunity for transformation due to the work of God in Jesus Christ.
