Our Need for Silence

Silence. Nowadays, silence is something we have so little of. Between our devices, social media, constant 24/7 news, and the roar of the highways (especially in Carlisle), there is very little silence. Psychologists know that silence and quiet time is important for us as humans, both mentally and physically. Silence offers us time for self-reflection and daydreaming, which allows our brains time to reset, a time to turn down outward distractions and our inner noise. Finding stillness and silence shouldn't leave us feeling afraid of "missing out" or to distract ourselves from our personal thoughts, feelings, or boredom. Learning to sit still in silence is one of the greatest gifts we can give ourselves and our children.

Jesus would find quiet time to become closer to God. Jesus would draw away from people and daily activities to be alone with his Father. This is how he made important decisions, dealt with difficult emotions, and cared for his soul. I figure, if Jesus needed solitude and silence, we probably do, too! "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed." (Mark 1:35)

Quiet time for most of us is becoming a precious commodity. I encourage you to create some space each day, to find a quiet place of retreat, and listen for God. An article written by Shanté Grossett from the website <u>dailyshepursues.com</u> states *"If you never stop to listen, how will you know what decisions to make in life? If we believe that God guides our lives, then we need to take time to listen to His guidance. Quiet time with God helps you to do this well. While God is always speaking, we don't always have the ears to hear. We need to create space to slow down, listen, and then act according to God's word."*

So, find a quiet place and learn to be still. No distractions, no thoughts, just listen. You might be pleasantly surprised. *"Be still, and know that I am God" Psalm 46:10*

- To those who envisioned lavishing love on grandchildren, yet that dream is not to be we grieve with you

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

Hosanna Branch Wavers

Supplies:

- Green construction paper- 4 sheets
- 4-8 ice-cream/popsicle sticks
- Tape
- A pencil
- Scissors
- A glue-stick

This craft takes approximately 10 minutes to make.

Instructions:

- 1. Outline your child's hand on the green construction paper. (Make a minimum of 6 outlines. 8-10 will make your child's waver really wave!)
- 2. If your child is old enough to use a pair or scissors, allow him/her to cut around the hand print outlines. Otherwise, leave this part to the adult supervising the craft.
- 3. Now stick the hand print outlines two on each row and build on upwards.
- 4. Finally tape two sticks to the bottom of the "branch" securely with the tape. (Two sticks on top of each other will make the handles thicker.)
 - 5. Read Matthew 21: 1-11 and have the kids waive their "palms".
